Peony Growth Stages by Michelle Ovans

The life cycle of the peony is the same each year. This cycle consists of three phases: plant growth, flower growth, and rest phase. As we head into the winter months the peonies are in their rest phase, for herbaceous peonies, the part of plant above the soil line dies signaling that it has gone dormant.

In the winter months I find that I have extra time to read and learn more about the peony care and culture. My ultimate goal is to provide the best care for my peonies throughout the growing season to ensure the greatest number of blooms for the following season.

ne of the main elements that has a direct impact on the number of blooms is the maturity of the plant. Peony plants are considered mature between three and four years old, patience is one of the hardest things I find in the evolution of

the quest for multiple blooms, but understanding the stages of growth is vital in my quest to get the most blooms from our cherished plants.

When purchasing roots to plant in the fall, one of the elements that we look for is the number of "eyes" that are attached to a piece of crown tissue. It's recommended that we purchase or divide our peony roots so that they have at least three eyes. Why is this important? These eyes are dormant buds that contain the plant structure, which grow into stems, leaves, and flowers for the next season. Not all of these buds will become new growth. These buds are present on the roots throughout the year in smaller forms and are most developed in the fall.

You may be wondering what are the best conditions for peony growth. In my experience, the number one condition is very good soil drainage. The soil preparation when planting a new root cannot be overemphasized. Having the soil analyzed and applying the elements that may be deficient. Best bloom production is achieved when the soil pH is approximately 6.

The second condition is adequate water. Early spring, the buds begin to swell as the temperature increases, and they start absorbing warm spring rain. It's critical that the plants receive at least 1 inch of rain a week during this timeframe for good bud development.

I will continue to the third condition which is also water and, in my opinion, one of the most crucial conditions. Once the peonies have bloomed it's easy to basically consider them done for the season and redirect our focus on other blooming flowers. Peonies tolerate dryness, but during the growing season, the plants are busy in the photosynthesis phase and storing food in big storage roots. Storage of food is where the new growth of roots and eyes comes from. Without this phase, we will not see an increase in next year's blooms. Peonies tolerate dryness but don't expect them to be producing and storing food while the soil is dry. With prolonged moisture stress, we can expect to bring on early die-off of the foliage, which will end the photosynthesis of food storage and limit the plant's ability to obtain its best performance for the following season.

The fourth condition is the removal of the seed pods. The removal of the pods allows all the energy to go into energy storage for root growth and development of eyes and not the act of reproduction.

In conclusion, I would suggest that for maximum blooms that you focus on the development of the roots. It's basically, a root crop you are cultivating to achieve the most blooms.

Getting To Know Your WPS Board Member: Jerri O'Connor Interview by Tracey Nelson

Q: Have you ever participated in an APS Show? If so, what was your favorite aspect of the show?

A: I have gone to several APS Conventions. My favorite part is going on a tour of the peony gardens. I love seeing how they look in the garden. I also look forward to seeing all the different varieties of peonies at the flower show. It helps me to decide on what I need next, even if I don't have the room

Q: Of the APS shows you've attended, which was your favorite and why?

A: My favorite convention would have to be Minnesota because of the tours. I loved seeing so many varieties of peonies and beautiful gardens.

Q: If you had the opportunity to meet any peony hybridizer of the past, who would it be and why?

A: I would have loved to have met Bill Seidl. He has my favorite forms of peonies.

Q: Are there any peonies on your "most wanted" list?

A: Yes, 'Drolla', 'White Vanguard', 'Kim', Triphena Parkin', Mandaleen', and 'Nelda's Joy'.

Q: How did you come to joining WPS?

A: I joined WPS because of Scott Parker. He was at the Garden Expo with his mom, working in the booth. I went to his demo on dividing peonies. I didn't know there were so many varieties out there. I picked up Adelman's catalog and bought a bunch. I haven't stopped since.

Q: You volunteer for WPS as both a current board member and a person who organizes the booth at Garden Expo in Madison. What do you enjoy about your level of involvement in WPS in your current roles?

A: Love being on the board. You find out things first and help make some decisions on things. What I enjoy the most is the people. Peony people are so friendly and have a great love for their peonies.

Q: If you were to give a WPS member advice about becoming more involved in the organization and its benefits, what would that advice be?

A: The benefit of being a member is you can learn anything about taking great care of your peonies. It's great to hear from other members about what they have planted. You end up adding plants you might not have considered when you hear how much they like them. Ha! I have gotten quite a few this way. The best thing is getting new Peony Pals!

Q: Lastly, I have gotten to see some pictures of your hybridizing efforts, which I have found impressive. When did you begin hybridizing? What inspired you to start hybridizing peonies and how do you feel about the progress you have made thus far? I'd love it if you could share a picture or two of your creations.

A: Ha! I really don't know exactly, but it has been several years now. I wanted to give it a try, so I started in the winter. I started a notebook writing down all of the peonies that had seeds. I then placed orders for roots, with my favorite selections. I had written about it on a Facebook page. One hybridizer asked, why I would have chosen the peonies that I chose. The person said, we really need more hybrids. I started to study up on my favorites. My goal is to get stronger stems, I was less concerned about flower form as the ones I chose had good form. I made notes over the winter, of which crosses I would want to try. I began to hybridize that summer. A few years later, I had my first flowers, which was very exciting. I would give them a couple of years of blooming before fully evaluating the peony. I began to cull the peonies that were not up to my standards, not worthy of keeping. I love watching the seedlings develop and bloom. I have a couple of beds full now and am really looking forward to seeing what develops with my breeding in the coming years.

2024 Annual Root Auction by Rita Thomas

We had 111 roots available to auction and proceeds from the sale totaled \$5,140 less \$370 in peony bucks used. The Peony Bucks were earned by members for volunteering at various events throughout the year.

One peony you don't see for sale often, called Blue Rose, was part of the auction. It is described on the APS Peony Registry as "a most unusual shade of deep rose which carries more blue than any peony we know of. The bloom is very large, fully double and as sweetly fragrant as a rose".

Our top sellers were Sunny Boy, which was donated by Sharon Schmitz and sold for \$195, and Seidl's Super, which has Sunny Boy as a parent. This one was donated by Tracey Nelson, and it also sold for \$195. Both are outstanding yellow peonies. Thank you to all who donated peonies for the auction. It couldn't happen without you.
