

More than 100 items were generously donated by WPS members and affiliated businesses for the 2025 auction, contributing to its great success. The quality of these contributions were not run-of-the-mill standards seen in retail stores or even garden centers, but high quality hybrids, such as the Mackinac Grand, Manitowoc Maiden and Lemon Chiffon. With a diverse price range, there was something for everyone, providing a significant boost to WPS's financial standing.

Scott's extensive knowledge of the peonies growth habits, their performance in Wisconsin gardens, and the hybridizer, assisted bidders in determining the value of adding these plants to their collections.

The auction atmosphere was vibrant, yet it allowed sufficient time to ensure no bid was missed.

2025 WPS Auction by the Numbers


The Wisconsin Peony Society October 2025 root auction sold 115 roots, 3 gift certificates, and 4 books.

The gross auction receipts came to \$5,767.50; out of that came \$445 in Peony Bucks, and \$105.32 in credit card fees (on \$2,957.50 in credit card sales). Our net receipts were \$5,217.18.

The average selling price per peony was \$49.67, but ten roots sold for over \$100, three for \$200 and up, and the most paid for a peony at the auction was \$250.

There were 28 registrants, of whom 23 bought at least one peony. Lois Girton, APS President, donated 14 of her books to sell for WPS profit. The book, *A Tyranny of Peonies*, tracks A. Percy Saunders' peony introductions, his fascinating life, and his contributions to our present day peony forms and seasons. Four books were sold at this auction, and the rest will be available at the Garden Expo in February.

BEST GARDENING PRACTICES FOR SHARING PEONIES

To prevent the spread of diseases and pests, it is importantl to follow appropriate gardening practices when preparing peonies for sharing. In the following article, the technique used by one of our valued members, Sharon Schmitz, is outlined.



After carefully excavating the roots and performing an initial separation, I wash them thoroughly yet gently, making sure to avoid the new eyes to prevent washing them away.

Next, I begin to divide the roots into individual sections, washing them as I go since there's quite a bit of dirt trapped between them. I also clean out any empty holes that may have formed as the peony aged.

Occasionally, I encounter worms that have burrowed deep within the roots. I continue washing until no dirt

remains visible.



After I have divided all the roots, making sure that each division can support its number of eyes, I spray them with rubbing alcohol. After the alcohol has evaporated, I store them in peat moss until they are ready to be given away.

One helpful tip I've discovered for dividing the roots is to leave all the leaves intact for a day. The leaves draw moisture from the roots, making them supple and much easier to separate. I trim the leaves just before I start washing.

This method takes me approximately 2 hours per plant. I use a significant amount of water.

Peony Division Notes from Scott Parker's Root Division Demonstration

WPS President Scott Parker demonstrated root cutting on a hybrid root and a nonhybrid lactiflora root at our fall auction. Some notes I jotted down follow. If you haven't yet seen this demonstration, I highly recommend it! First, why would you want to dig up a peony root and divide it? Well, to share or propagate is a primary reason. Leave the stems and leaves on. This will draw some moisture from the roots making them more pliable and easier to divide. When dividing, we cut out any rotten parts so only strong, healthy roots remain, and new roots can then grow. "Wash the soil off from bottom to top to avoid damage to the fragile eyes. Aim for three to five eyes per division. These eyes are buds for next year's stems, leaves, and flowers. Hybrids will have more difficulty finding 3 eyes near each other, so will have fewer cuttings compared with a lactiflora. Hybrids have "big sausage roots," that's how you can usually identify them. A lactiflora will have finer roots and will likely also have more eyes allowing for more divisions. Always clean tools between peonies (Lysol wipes are an excellent option) and use bypass (not anvil) pruners for a clean cut. What's "normal" for Scott? 4 divisions in 4 years per root. Digging up every 3 to 5 yrs is normal for production. 'Sharon's Blush' peony has many divisions. Not a hybrid, and tiny roots so more divisions are possible on this variety.

Make the hybrid roots look "like hands" by cutting off some of the excess sausage root, balancing the remaining root with the number of eyes. Cutting back the storrage roots (the big fat ones) creates room for the fine feeder root growth. The speed of growth differs by variety. For example, "Lorelei' is slow as dirt."

"Liners" are straight roots with only a single eye. Not salable, but a grower would put it back into the field to grow for future use. When digging the planting hole, wood bark can be mixed into soil to aid drainage. Pro tip: throw an extra tag in the hole so you always know what it is. Thank you for your valuable notes, Scott!



WHAT ARE ADVENTITIOUS SHOOTS IN PEONIES?

In peonies, an adventitious roots refers to a new shoot that arises from a "blind" root, which lacks obvious vegetative buds or crown tissue. This type of growth is quite unusual, as new stems typically emerge from the crown, the junction where the main root system connects with the stems.

While it's possible for root fragments to sprout new stems, this phenomenon, known as an adventitious stem, is primarily observed in certain hybrids and is not a common trait among all peony roots.

This unique ability enables specific peony varieties to regenerate from detached root fragments left in the soil, resulting in unexpected new plants sprouting.

Not all peony varieties can produce adventitious stems; this characteristic is primarily found in some herbaceous hybrids, particularly those with P. officinalis or P. peregrina in their lineage.

The widely known P. lactiflora cultivars, or Chinese peonies, generally do not generate adventitious stems from blind roots. This is why they are often utilized as "nurse roots" for grafting tree peonies.



When woody (tree) peonies are grafted onto a herbaceous nurse root with adventitious capabilities, the nurse root may sometimes produce its own stems as shown in the photo.. Note the different leaf forms. If allowed to grow unchecked, these adventitious stems can overshadow the woody peony.

The adventitious trait presents both advantages and challenges for gardeners and propagators. While it can be beneficial for propagation, it may also lead to issues if an old peony root remains in the soil and later emerges as an unwanted plant. Some "coral" colored peonies are particularly noted for their vigorous adventitious growth.
